The Summit was attended by representatives of 93 countries (including Ukraine and Switzerland, the host country) and 8 international organizations. The results of the Peace Summit will be presented to representatives of the Russian Federation. The content of the Joint Communiqué adopted at the meetings holds Russia responsible for the war in Ukraine, demands that it transfer control of the Zaporizhzhia nuclear power plant to Ukraine, open access to ports in the Black and Azov Seas, and return all prisoners of war and deported children. As of 20 June, 79 countries and 6 organizations

supported the communiqué. The Communiqué is open for signature by other actors after the Summit. > On the sidelines of the Global Peace Summit, President of Ukraine Volodymyr Zelenskyi met with President of the Republic of Palau Surangel Whipps Jr. Palau and Ukraine have established diplomatic relations. The meeting of the presidents was the first high-level contact between the two countries.

On 15-16 June 2024, the Global Peace Summit was held in Switzerland at the initiative of Ukraine.

> Zelenskyi also announced the second Peace Summit. "We already have countries that have expressed interest in hosting the second Peace Summit, and we have started negotiations with them," the president said. The second Ukrainian Peace Summit may be held before the US presidential election in November, Swiss Foreign Minister Ignazio Cassis said.

Norway will provide Ukraine with over \$100 million for energy recovery, according to a press release from the Norwegian government. In particular, \$11.2 million will be used to repair the energy infrastructure that supplies the Kharkiv region.

> Ukrainian rescuers received 69 special vehicles from partners from the UK, USA, Japan and Estonia.

The list includes armored mechanized demining vehicles and drone control stations.

> The Three Swords-24 exercise took place in Poland, with the participation of the Lithuanian-Polish-Ukrainian Brigade. The Ukrainian contingent consisted of soldiers of the Air Assault Forces of the Armed Forces of Ukraine.

> Canada has allocated \$38.1 million to support Ukraine. The money will, among other things, be used to restore the energy system, support vulnerable populations, and demine the territory. This was reported on the website of Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau.

> Future Ukrainian F-16 pilots are undergoing an accelerated training course in France on Alphajet jet training aircraft. This was reported by Le Monde. President of Ukraine Volodymyr Zelenskyi stressed that the fighter jets would arrive from Denmark in the near future.

> The Drone Coalition has raised €549 million for unmanned aerial vehicles for Ukraine. Latvia's Defense Minister Andris Sprūds said that the drone coalition currently officially includes 14 countries.

> The German concern Rheinmetall will supply Ukraine with a new Frankenstein air defense system, which is designed to shoot down missiles and drones. This is a Skyranger anti-aircraft turret system with a 35 mm autocannon on the chassis of a Leopard 1 tank.

> Italy is to provide Ukraine with long-range Storm Shadow missiles, II Fatto Quotidiano newspaper reports. The missiles are to be part of the ninth military aid package to be announced soon. It will also include the previously promised second SAMP/T air defense system.

> Hungarian opposition politician Péter Magyar said he opposed sending weapons to Ukraine but was ready to help in any other way. At the same time, he supported Ukraine's right to self-defense and called Putin an aggressor.

➤ The Danish Ministry of Defense has announced its 19th aid package to Ukraine, worth almost €161 million, which will be used to support the Ukrainian defense industry, purchase equipment for F-16 fighter jets and manufacture military equipment. Defense Minister Trolls Lund Poulsen said that with this package. Copenhagen is providing "the maximum possible support for Ukraine's needs on the battlefield here and now."

> The US defense company Northrop Grumman will open an ammunition production facility in Ukraine. This is a government project with state funding from Ukraine and with the approval of the US

government, Breaking Defense reports.

> The negotiating teams of Ukraine and the EU have completed work on the text of bilateral security guarantees, the Presidential Office reports. The parties agreed to sign the agreement in the near future. Media reported that in the draft agreement, the EU promised Ukraine further arms supplies, training, assistance in demining, defense sector reforms, cybersecurity, and more.

> The European Union has handed over 12 sapper dogs to the Ukrainian Armed Forces Support Force. From now on, their task will be to clear Ukrainian land of explosive hazards, unexploded

ordnance, and ammunition.

> EU ambassadors agree on the 14th package of sanctions against Russia. The new package will strengthen the existing restrictions by eliminating loopholes. The sanctions include a ban on the transshipment of Russian liquefied natural gas and liability of EU operators for violations of sanctions by their subsidiaries and partners in third countries.

The South Korean government plans to review the ban on the supply of lethal weapons to Ukraine. This information was published by Yonhap News. This was a response to the signing of a

strategic partnership agreement between Russia and the DPRK.

> Ukraine and the European Commission extended the "transport visa-free regime" for a year with the possibility of automatic prolongation until the end of 2025. Freight transport from Ukraine to the EU and from the EU to Ukraine will no longer require special permits.

> Romania will transfer one Patriot air defense system to Ukraine. The country's Supreme National Security Council announced the deterioration of the situation in Ukraine due to Russia's constant massive attacks, which has negative consequences for the security of Romania and Moldova.

The German arms concern Rheinmetall received the largest order in its history - 155 mm artillery ammunition for the Bundeswehr worth €8.5 billion. The contract is aimed at increasing the stockpile of the Bundeswehr and its allies, including Ukraine.

> The United States will give Ukraine priority in the supply of missiles for the Patriot and NASAMS systems. White House National Security Advisor John Kirby said the decision would provide Ukraine's air defense with sufficient supplies for the next 16 months.

> Ukroboron prom and private Ukrainian companies have signed a number of cooperation agreements with Thales and other French arms manufacturers. This was announced by Minister of Strategic Industries Oleksandr Kamyshin.

> Ukrainian troops can strike at any Russian forces on the Russian border, not just in the Kharkiv region (as previously stated), the Pentagon said. The day before, US National Security Advisor Jake Sullivan said that the agreement with Ukraine applies to "any place where Russian troops cross the border." The moratorium on strikes deep into Russian territory remains in place.

> The Netherlands will provide Ukraine with the Patriot system. Ukraine currently has at least four Patriot systems. The United States, Germany, and Romania have already promised to provide

additional systems.

- > The Russians have intensified their activities in the Lyman sector, increasing the number of assault operations. Fighting continues in the areas of Nevske and the Serebryanskyi forest.
- In the Kupiansk sector, enemy attacks in the areas of Stepove, Novoselivka, Miasozharivka, and Stelmakhivka were repelled.
- Moderate activity of Russian occupants is observed in the Siverskyi sector. Currently, the enemy is trying to push Ukrainian defenders from their positions near Verkhniokamianske. Spirne, and Rozdolivka.
- > In the Kramatorsk sector, the occupation forces continue to try to advance towards Chasiv Yar, near which a firefight is ongoing.
- > Ukrainian Defense Forces units are holding back the enemy in the Horlivka-Toretsk area. The fighting continues.
- > In the Pokrovsk sector, Ukrainian defenders are taking measures to prevent the advance of Russian troops. The enemy continues to pressure the positions near Novooleksandrivka, Vozdvyzhenka, Yevheniyka, Sokil, Novoseliyka Persha, and Novopokrovsk.
- In the Kurakhove sector, the enemy's assault near Heorhiivka and Paraskoviivka was unsuccessful.
- > In the Vremivsk sector, the enemy's attack near Staromaiorske was unsuccessful. Fighting continues near Vodiane.
- In the Orikhiv sector, an assault operation of the occupation forces near Robotyne failed. Fighting continues near Mala Tokmachka and Kamianske.
- > Border settlements of Sumy and Chernihiv oblasts continue to suffer from artillery shelling.

90.9 > The Azov and Burevii brigades jointly advanced 1 km into the Serebryanskyi forest and 2 km along the front. Thus, the units have completed one of the stages of offensive operations in their area. This happened in April, and the results of this work have only just been reported. > Over the past day, 123 combat engagements took place at the frontline. > At night, drones of Defense Intelligence of the MoD of Ukraine attacked military facilities in the Belgorod, Voronezh, and Lipetsk regions of the Russian Federation, according to Armiia TV. Among the targets were the Novolipetsk Metallurgical Plant and a local tractor plant (Lipetsk region), which work for the needs of Russian troops. > Over the past two months, Russia has lost about 15 air defense systems in the temporarily occupied Crimea. The defense forces hit, in particular, air defense divisions with the S-300, S-350, and S-400 modifications. Dozens of launchers of these systems, more than 15 radar stations, and more than 10 control centers 17.06 were destroyed. > The Crimean Bridge is no longer "important" from a military point of view. This was stated by Navy spokesman Dmytro Pletenchuk. Russians are launching a railroad between temporarily occupied Donetsk and Mariupol for military logistics in southern Ukraine. After successful strikes by the Security Service of Ukraine and the Navy, the Crimean Bridge is barely used for this purpose. > The Russian city of Belgorod reports a hit on an Iranian ammunition depot. > General Staff of Ukraine: Pokrovsk, Lyman, and Kurakhove sectors are the most active directions of the front. There were 14 attempts to storm the positions of Ukrainian troops in the Pokrovsk sector. The attack towards Novooleksandrivka was repelled. Fighting continues in the areas of Yevhenivka, Novoselivka Persha, Umanske, and Novooleksandrivka. In the Lyman sector, there were attacks in the areas of Hrekivka, Makiivka, and Torske. In the Kurakhove sector, Russians are trying to break through the defense in the areas of Krasnohorivka, Heorhiivka, and Paraskoviivka. > There were 136 combat engagements over the last day. > "The enemy is intensifying its attacks to reach the borders of Luhansk oblast," reports the Third Separate Assault Brigade of the Armed Forces of Ukraine. "The occupiers' immediate task is to reach the village of Cherneshchyna - Pershotravneve, with further capture of Borova. The enemy is advancing with tank regiments, entire companies, and detachments of private military companies and special forces. Artillery, FPV drones, smart bombs, and chemical weapons are actively involved in the fighting." > "In Azov, Rostov region, oil tanks are burning after a drone attack," the local governor reports. > Over the past 24 hours, 129 military clashes took place. > The Russians have moved 80% of their equipment and manpower from the Finnish border to Ukraine, according to Yle. Russia has promised to increase its

military presence near the border after Finland joined NATO, but its bases in the region are currently almost empty. > Dmytro Kukharchuk, a commander of the 3rd Assault Brigade, gave a lengthy interview. Here are some of his key points:

> There is no threat to Kharkiv in the next month, but there may be a threat in the next six months.

> The nature of the war has changed: today, unmanned surveillance and destruction means are of great importance.

> The creeping offensive, which the Russians are good at, can have not just unpleasant but critical consequences.

> During the day, 158 combat engagements were recorded on the frontline.

- > The press service of the Ukrainian Navy reports that Russia has deployed 2 ships to the Black Sea for combat duty, one of which is a carrier of the Kalibr missile system with a total volley of up to 4 missiles. There are 8 Russian warships in the Sea of Azov, two of which are Kalibr missile carriers with a total volley of up to 16 missiles.
- > "The F-16s will protect Kharkiv from air strikes by the smart bombs," The Guardian writes, citing its own sources. "The Russians will be forced to change their tactics. We will be able to hit their planes and missiles more effectively, and it will be very difficult for them to continue using guided smart bombs, which they need to launch at a distance of 50 to 70 km," said aviation expert Anatolii Khrapchynskyi.
- > Over the past day, 149 combat engagements took place on the frontline.
- > Ukraine's defense forces successfully hit a number of oil refinery facilities and other important targets of the Russian Federation. It was confirmed that on the night of June 20, units of the Armed Forces of Ukraine and the Security Service of Ukraine attacked the enemy's fuel and lubricants depot in the Tambov region, as well as the Enem oil depot in the Republic of Adygea. The damage to the enemy's fuel and lubricants depot in the Tambov region has also been confirmed. On the night of June 21, unmanned aerial vehicles attacked the Afipskyi, Ilskyi, Krasnodar, and Astrakhan oil refineries. In addition, strikes were launched against radar stations and electronic intelligence centers of the Russian invaders in the Briansk region and the temporarily occupied Crimea.
- > Also, last night, the Ukrainian Defense Forces successfully struck the storage and preparation areas for the use of Shahed-136/Geran-2, training buildings, control and communication centers of these UAVs located in the Krasnodar region. As a result of the strike, a series of explosions and a fire with subsequent detonation were recorded.
- > There were 141 combat engagements over the last day.
- > Russians managed to capture the village of Shumy in the Bakhmut region of Donetsk oblast, as reported by the DeepState analytical project. According to their data, Russian troops have advanced in Pivnichne, which is now a new hotspot. Given the situation, the Russians' goal is to capture Toretsk.
- > Russia is withdrawing some units from near Vovchansk due to the loss of combat capability, according to Nazar Voloshyn, spokesman for the Khortytsia Operational and Strategic Group of troops. The withdrawal is recorded near Lyptsi and Tykhe. Russians did not conduct active hostilities in this area yesterday and this morning.

Attack on the night of June 20

Air defense forces shot down 32 air targets at night: 5 missiles and 27 drones.

The air defense system was operating in Dnipropetrovsk, Zaporizhzhia, Donetsk, Mykolaiv, Kherson, Kharkiv, Kyiv, Cherkasy, Poltava, and Vinnytsia oblasts. Energy infrastructure was damaged in the oblasts.

Attack on the night of June 21

That night, air defense systems shot down all 4 X-59/X-69 guided missiles that the Russians launched at Ukraine. They were destroyed in Kirovohrad and Kherson oblasts.

Attack on the night of June 22

During the night, air defense forces destroyed all 13 drones and 12 of 16 missiles of various types.

- ➤ A critical energy infrastructure facility was hit in Lviv oblast.
- > An energy infrastructure facility was hit in Zaporizhzhia region. Two power engineers were wounded (one fatally).
- ➤ In Ivano-Frankivsk region, there was a hit that partially destroyed several buildings of an educational institution and nearby houses. There is also damage to residential buildings in one of the communities in the region.
- In Volyn, debris damaged a house and an agricultural building in the Lutsk community.

Sumy and the oblast

On June 17, a shop building was damaged in Yunakivka due to Russian shelling. Russian troops dropped 3 grenades from a drone on the village of Mohrytsia and attacked with two kamikaze drones. As a result, one private house was damaged. The village of Zapsillia in the Myropillia community in the Sumy oblast was also attacked by Russian drones. A private house was damaged.

Mykolaivka, Khotyn, Esman, Yunakivka, Bilopillia, Krasnopillia, Hlukhiv, Shalyhyne, Seredyna-Buda, Velyka Pysarivka, Svesa, Znob-Novhorod, and Myropillia communities were shelled.

Zaporizhzhia and the oblast

A fire broke out in the town of Orikhiv, Polohy district, as a result of Russian shelling on June 19. An agricultural building was on fire. Rescuers completed emergency search operations at the site of a Russian air strike on the village of Vozdvyzhivka. Two wounded were pulled out from the ruins: A 58-year-old woman and a 32-year-old man. One dead person was found.

Charivne, Huliaipole, Levadne, Robotyne, Mala Tokmachka, Malynivka, Novoandriivka, Terenuvate, Kamianske, Zaliznychne, Piatykhatky, Varvarivka, Shcherbaky, and Verbove were under fire.

Kharkiv and the oblast

On June 17, Shyikivka and Druzheliubivka were hit by Russian aerial bombs overnight, and three people were wounded in Pisky-Radkivski as a result of a guided aerial bomb strike. On June 19, a woman was killed, and at least six people were wounded in the Kharkiv oblast as a result of Russian shelling. The Russians fired at Kharkiv with UMPB D-30 aerial bombs, at Vilkhivka also with aerial bombs, and at Novoosynove and Kruhliatsivka with FAB-250 bombs. A man was wounded in Ruski Tyshky as a result of shelling on June 20. On June 21, in Vovchansk, two employees of Ukrposhta were attacked by an enemy UAV. As a result, a woman was killed, and a man was injured. In Kharkiv district, Vilkhivka community, 10 private houses were damaged by shelling. A man was injured. A woman was killed. The rescue and search operation in a five-story building in the Osnovianskyi district after the Russian air strike was completed: two people died in the building, and 53 others were injured after the attack on June 22. In total, 56 people were injured, and three were killed as a result of the June 22 attack on Kharkiv. Russia also struck a private household in Hlushkivka. An agricultural building burned down, and a woman was injured. In Milove, a residential building was destroyed: one person was killed, and five people were wounded. Two men were wounded by an FPV drone strike in Lyman on the Kharkiv-Vovchansk highway.

Petropavlivka, Slatyne, Kurylivka, Kamiana Yaruha, Hlushkivka, Zahryzove, Bilyi Kolodiaz, Vidrodzhenivske, Kantsedalivka and Borshchova, Lyptsi, Vilkhivka, Pisky Radkivski, Shyikivka, Druzheliubivka, Borivska Andriivka, Borova, Dvorichanske, Nova Kozacha, Khotimlia, Kupiansk, Ruski Tyshky, and the town of Kharkiv, Staryi Saltiv, and Vovchansk. The shelling damaged private homes, kindergartens, civilian infrastructure, businesses, shops, critical infrastructure facilities, and cars.

Dnipro and the oblast

On June 16, Russians shelled the Nikopol district with kamikaze drones and heavy artillery. A 60-year-old woman and a 57-year-old man were wounded. On June 17, three people were wounded as a result of artillery shelling of Nikopol. On June 18, a 37-year-old man was wounded in the shelling of Nikopol district. 14 private houses were damaged, an outbuilding was destroyed, and power lines and gas pipelines were damaged. On the night of June 20, Russians massively attacked the Dnipropetrovs'k region with missiles and drones. Three people were injured in the Kryvyi Rih and Nikopol districts. In the afternoon, the Nikopol district was shelled again, damaging seven private houses. On June 21, Russian troops launched a missile attack on the infrastructure of Kryvyi Rih. Two people were injured. Nikopol district was also attacked 15 times during the day, resulting in the injury of a 71-year-old woman. On June 22, the Russians attacked the Nikopol district almost 25 times.

Donetsk oblast

Pokrovsk district. Selydove, Kurakhove, Dachne of the Kurakhove community, Prohress of the Hrodivka community, Shevchenko of the Pokrovsk community, and Hostre were under fire. In the Marinka community, Maksymilianivka, Paraskoviivka, and Kostiantynivka were shelled. Houses, cars, and an enterprise were damaged.

Kramatorsk district. Torske, Terny, Yampolivka, Zarichne, and Zakitne were shelled in the Lyman community. The outskirts of the Kostiantynivka community are under fire. Ivanopillia and Rozkishne of the Illinivka community were also shelled. Houses, a business, and an industrial facility were damaged.

Bakhmut district. Chasiv Yar, Toretsk, Druzhba, Pivnichne, New York, Siversk, Serebrianka are under fire. Private houses, multi-story buildings, non-residential premises, an industrial building, and parking lots were damaged.

Mykolaiv oblast

On June 17, Russian troops launched a missile attack on Voznesensk district. Russia also attacked the villages of Solonchaky and Dmytrivka of the Kutsurub community with FPV drones. Private houses were damaged, and a 69-year-old woman was injured. The water area of the Ochakiv community also came under mortar fire. On June 19, Russians shelled the Kutsurub community with artillery. Houses and a medical facility were damaged. On June 21, the Russian army shelled the Ochakiv and Kutsurub communities with artillery and drones.

Odesa oblast

On June 17, the Russian army launched a missile attack on the territory of the oblast. On June 19, the Russians attacked the coastal zone of the oblast with a ballistic missile, probably an Iskander-M. On June 21, a missile strike on the coastal zone damaged a recreational infrastructure facility.

Kherson and the oblast

On June 16, Russians shelled 9 localities. Two people were wounded. On the morning of June 17, the Russian military attacked Osokorivka, Beryslav district, with a drone. A 50-year-old man was killed. Also, a man died as a result of mortar shelling in Kherson. In total, 17 inhabited areas were shelled during the day. On the night of June 18, Russian aviation struck Burhunka with guided aerial bombs. In total, Russians shelled 19 settlements during the day, injuring two people. On June 19, Russian troops shelled 26 localities. In particular, one person was killed, and two others were wounded as a result of shelling in the Dniprovskyi district of Kherson. A 67-year-old woman was also injured in Olhivka. On June 20, Russians shelled 15 localities. A man died in Kherson. On June 21, 17 localities were shelled, killing one person and injuring four others. On June 22, the Russian military dropped explosives from a drone on a local resident in Kherson, injuring him. Two people were wounded in the artillery shelling of Dudchany village. A 20-year-old man was wounded in Novovorontsovka.

During the week, Russians were shelling the following populated areas of the oblast: Kizomys, Antonivka, Shliakhove, Prydniprovske, Dniprovske, Tokarivka, Tiahynka, Novotiahynka, Olhivka, Zarichne, Yantarne, Stanislav, Sofiyivka, Shyroka Balka, Zolota Balka, Tomyna Balka, Inzhenerne, Sadove, Beryslav, Mykolaivka, Novomykolaivka, Burhunka, Osokorivka, Havrylivka, Mykhaylivka, Kozatske, Virivka, Lvove, Oleksandrivka, Mala Oleksandrivka, Novodmytrivka Romashkove, Bilozerka, Veletenske, Ivanivka, Chervonyi Maiak, Zmiivka, Respublikanets, Odradokamianka, Trudoliubivka, Potiomkine, Poniativka, Kherson.

Chernihiv oblast

During the week, Russians were bombarding with mortars, cannon and rocket artillery, and UAVs four border communities: Novhorod-Siversk, Semenivka, Snovsk, and Horodnianka. In particular, on June 19, Russian troops dropped explosives from a drone on a residential building in the village of Kostobobriv in the Semenivka community. A 55-year-old man received shrapnel wounds.






Dnipropetrovsk oblast

➤ The Center of National Resistance reported that the temporarily occupied territories of Ukraine have low viewing ratings for Russian media. Therefore, representatives of the Russian occupation administrations were instructed to take measures to increase the coverage of Russian news in the region. Most residents ignore the satellite TV sets provided by the occupiers. Another reason for the figures is that the Ukrainian signal reaches up to 20 km, and locals also watch the news online.

- After the forced **displacement of Ukrainian children** to the temporarily occupied territories, the Russian occupiers offered them 100 thousand rubles **for moving to Russian cities** of their choice, The Independent reports. Journalist Tom Watling learned about this from five Ukrainian teenagers who have already been returned from Russia after being illegally taken there.
- Russian occupants are **increasing property pressure** on residents of occupied Melitopol in the Zaporizhzhia region. Zaporizhzhia Regional Military Administration Chairman Ivan Fedorov reported this. "They organized raids and filtration to identify "ownerless property," squeeze it out, and dispose of it at their discretion to settle military or imported workers or to sell it later," he said.
- Law enforcement officers from the White Angels evacuation group evacuated six people from frontline villages in the Avdiivka sector. The locals were moved out with their belongings and animals. According to the police, the front line is almost close to the villages, and the Russian military is shooting at all the houses. Seven people remain in Vovche village.
- ➤ At least 12,000 Ukrainian civilians have been killed by the Russian invasion, including 551 children. These figures were provided by Prosecutor General Andrii Kostin. In addition, almost 130,000 cases of war crimes committed by the Russian military have been documented, including 301 cases of sexual violence.
- ➤ On June 10-16, 157 people from the frontline regions left for the Lviv region. In total, about 6,000 people have been **evacuated to the Lviv region** since the beginning of the year. According to the press service of the Lviv Regional Military Administration, people mostly needed information and psychological assistance, as well as support and accommodation.
- ➢ Power lines in Poltava district were damaged after the missile strike, leaving more than 55,000 consumers without electricity. Philip Pronin, the head of Poltava Regional Electricity Company, reported this on Telegram.
- The head of the Luhansk Regional Military Academy, Artem Lysohor, says that the occupiers will teach students to fly drones. It is noted that the university department in the temporarily occupied territories (TOT) has already created an aircraft fleet of drones and installed simulation flight training complexes. The Luhansk regional administration adds that meanwhile, teachers and professors working for Russia are being trained to teach a course to university students and high school students called "Fundamentals of Russian Statehood," propaganda lectures with anti-Western rhetoric that denies the existence of Ukraine.

➤ The International Atomic Energy Agency will **support the construction of new power units** at Khmelnytskyi NPP and considers these intentions of Ukraine timely considering the critical energy situation in the country.

- ➤ The Verkhovna Rada approved as a basis draft law No. 10132, which provides for support and restoration of the rights of victims of sexual violence as a result of Russian armed aggression. The draft law provides for the definition of the legal status of survivors of sexual violence or those who have died or are deceased, as well as their family members.
- In schools in the occupied territories of Ukraine, Russians systematically suppress the Ukrainian language, conduct anti-Ukrainian propaganda, and impose Russian as the only language of instruction. Such actions constitute a war crime, according to a report by the international human rights organization Human Rights Watch.
- Another 10 children with their families from the temporarily occupied territories were returned to the government-controlled part of Ukraine, said Dmytro Lubinets, the Ukrainian Parliament Commissioner for Human Rights. According to him, the Russian occupation authorities forced the children to go to a Russian school and sing the Russian anthem every Monday. Some managed to get Ukrainian education online, but parents were threatened that their children would be taken away.
- ➤ The head of the Kherson regional military administration, Oleksandr Prokudin, said that **seven more children** aged 4 months to 13 years had been **returned from the TOTs** in the Kherson region to the Ukrainian-controlled territory. He said that these were three boys and four girls.
- ➤ In the temporarily occupied territories, Russian doctors have once again begun to conduct forced medical examinations of Ukrainian children to **send them to "health camps."** The Center for National Resistance reports. The refusal to go is a ground for initiating a case against the parents for improper upbringing with subsequent deprivation of parental rights.
- ➤ Director General of the Center for Energy Research Oleksandr Kharchenko said that despite the announced foreign support of \$1 billion, it will take **years of recovery to restore Ukraine's energy sector**. The return of ZNPP and the launch of 2-3 reactors could significantly change the situation.
- According to the latest data, **43 children were taken by Russians** from the occupied Berdiansk in Zaporizhzhia **to the Chuvash Republic**. The Ukrainian Parliament Commissioner for Human Rights, Dmytro Lubinets, reported this.
