> The Netherlands will transfer 28 Viking amphibious armored vehicles to Ukraine. The Dutch Marine Corps has trained Ukrainian soldiers to operate these vehicles. > The Minister of Defense of Estonia urged partners not to restrict Ukraine's use of weapons transferred

> The Prime Minister of Denmark also stated that Europe, the U.S., and other partners of Ukraine should lift restrictions on the use of long-range weapons.

➤ The Netherlands announced a new aid package worth over €200 million for Ukraine. The package aims to protect and repair energy infrastructure and includes additional funding for humanitarian assistance.

> The Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) transferred 97 units of heavy machinery to municipal enterprises in the cities of Kharkiv, Dnipro, Kherson, and Mykolaiv. The machinery will improve services in the areas of transportation, water supply, and waste processing from the destruction.

> The U.S. is close to an agreement on long-range JASSM missiles for Ukraine, reports Reuters. The inclusion of these missiles in the weapons package is expected this fall, although a final decision has not yet been made. Military analysts suggest that the transfer of JASSM, which is stealthy and can hit targets further than most missiles in Ukraine's arsenal, could push back Russian strongholds and supply depots hundreds of kilometers.

Norway allocated €48.28 million to Ukraine for the purchase of drones and air defense systems.

> Italy will manufacture a new SAMP/T anti-aircraft battery for Ukraine instead of transferring a readymade system from its reserves. This was reported by Defense Minister Guido Crosetto.

> The U.K. Minister of Defense confirmed that a contract for the purchase of 152-mm ammunition for Ukraine, valued at £300 million, has been signed.

> Ukraine and Ireland signed a bilateral security agreement. This year, Ireland will allocate an additional €128 million to Ukraine for non-lethal military support and at least €40 million for humanitarian aid. Ireland will also provide demining systems and equipment for disarming explosives, participate in the Demining Coalition, and train Ukrainian soldiers.

Ukraine completed debt restructuring — it was reduced by \$9 billion. Debt payments will decrease by 93%, saving \$11.4 billion over the next three years.

> Germany ordered 17 IRIS-T air defense systems for Ukraine, announced Chancellor Olaf Scholz. By 2026, Ukraine will receive a total of 24 IRIS-T systems from Germany—12 medium-range and 12 shortrange, according to Bloomberg.

A Ukrainian defense company began cooperating with Poland's ALS Systems and transferred licenses for the production of its advanced drones.

Sweden will allocate nearly €44 million to support energy and heating in Ukraine. These funds will be used to install two gas turbines for electricity generation. It is one of Sweden's largest contributions to Ukraine's energy sector, helping to provide electricity for 185,000 people.

> In London, a protest was held against the shelling of peaceful Ukrainian cities by the Russian army. Protesters called on the government to lift the ban on the use of British long-range missiles against military targets on Russian territory.

Romanian President Klaus Iohannis signed a decree to transfer a Patriot air defense system to Ukraine.

> Canada will transfer a modern NASAMS air defense system to Ukraine early next year. This was told by Canadian Defense Minister Bill Blair in an interview with CBC News.

> Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyi participated in the 24th meeting of the Ukraine Defense Contact Group in the "Ramstein" format. One of the key results of the meeting was the signing of the Maritime Capabilities Coalition (MCC) Regulation. This year, Ukraine is placing special emphasis on "maritime defense."

> The U.K. will transfer 650 Martlet multi-purpose air defense missiles worth £162 million (€192 million) to Ukraine.

➤ The European Commission will allocate €40 million to Ukraine for the repair of energy infrastructure.

> Germany and its partners will transfer 77 more Leopard 1A5 tanks and 12 Panzerhaubitze 2000 howitzers to Ukraine. It was announced by German Defense Minister Boris Pistorius at the

"Ramstein" meeting. Six howitzers will be delivered this year and six next year. > The Netherlands will transfer spare parts and missiles for F-16 fighter jets to Ukraine.

Canada will provide more than 80,000 CRV7 ground attack missiles, 970 C6 machine guns, and 64 Coyote LAV reconnaissance vehicles to Ukraine.

> Lithuania will allocate ten million euros for the purchase of Ukrainian "Palianytsia" drone missiles. This was announced by the former minister for strategic industries, Kamyshin.

> The U.S. included infantry fighting vehicles Bradley and M113 armored personnel carriers in its new aid package for Ukrainé. The Pentagon's website reported that the aid package is provided by presidential directive (PDA) and is estimated at \$250 million. The package includes armored vehicles, artillery ammunition, patrol boats, anti-tank weapons, missiles for air defense systems, and HIMARS ammunition.

> The Spanish government will send a full **HAWK air defense battery** to Ukraine. The battery includes 6 launchers to strike air targets.

> Spain joined the "IT coalition" and the "maritime" coalition to provide defense capabilities to Ukraine. This was confirmed by Spanish Defense Minister Margarita Robles.

> The U.S. and Ukraine are working together to develop a "replacement" for Soviet S-300 air defense systems and R-27 aviation missiles. It was said by U.S. Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin at the 24th Ukraine Defense Contact Group meeting in Ramstein.

> By the end of the year, the EU will purchase €300 million worth of weapons for Ukraine from France. This will be funded from frozen Russian assets. EU will buy ammunition, artillery, and air defense equipment.

> President Volodymyr Zelenskyi met with Italian Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni. The leaders discussed the reconstruction and rebuilding of Ukraine, particularly the energy system, and the implementation of the Ukrainian peace formula.

> Sweden joined the demining coalition. This was announced by the Lithuanian defense minister, one of the coalition's founding countries.

> The American company D&M Holding Company opened an ammunition production plant in Ukraine.







- > Several battles took place in the Kharkiv direction. The Ukrainian defense forces repelled enemy assaults near Vovchansk and Lyptsi.
- > Towards Kupiansk, there were firefights near Synkivka, Hlushkivka, Andriiivka, Berestove and Stelmakhivka.
- Towards Lyman, the enemy attacked near Novoyehorivka, Druzheliubivka, Cherneshchyna, Terny, Torske, Dibrova and Makiiivka.
- Several combat clashes occurred in the Siverskyi direction. Ukrainian troops repelled enemy assaults near Verkhniokamianske and Spirne.
- In the Kramatorsk direction, fighting continued in the areas of Hryhorivka, Chasiv Yar and Andriiivka.
- Towards Toretsk, the Russian forces attacked near Toretsk, Nelipivka and Niu York.
- > Towards Pokrovsk, Ukrainian defenders repelled enemy assaults near Sukha Balka, Oleksandropil, Zelene Pole, Vozdvyzhenka, Novotroiitske, Hrodivka, Novohrodivka and Mykhailivka. The highest concentration of attacks was near Novohrodivka, Hrodivka and Mykhailivka.
- Towards Kurakhove, Ukrainian forces repelled enemy attacks near Krasnohorivka, Kostiantynivka and Heorhiiivka.
 Towards Vremivka, Russians were advancing toward Vodiane and Staromaiorsk.
- > In the Orikhiv direction, Russian troops stormed the positions of Ukrainian units near Mala Tokmachka.
- In the Prydniprovskyi direction, the Russian military was defeated while attacking Ukrainian defensive lines. The situation in the Huliaipole direction remained unchanged.
- > Towards Volyn and Polissia, no signs of formation of enemy offensive groups were detected.
- > On the border with Chernihiv and Sumy oblasts, the enemy maintains a military presence, conducts mortar and artillery shelling of settlements from the territory of the Russian Federation.

	guards are strengthening their defense in Chernihiv oblast. Moscow and Moscow oblast were attacked by at least 9 drones. One of them crashed into a technical room near a refinery, causing a fire. In Moscow oblast, UAVs attacked the Kashira thermal power plant. In Tver oblast, local authorities reported a drone attack near the Konakovo thermal power plant, a fire broke out. In total, the Russian Defense Ministry reported the alleged downing of 158 drones over Kursk, Bryansk, Voronezh, Belgorod, Ryazan, Moscow, Kaluga, Lipetsk, Tula, Tambov, Smolensk, Orel, Tver, and Ivanovo oblasts. Russia may launch an offensive on Dnipropetrovsk oblast in the spring of 2025 – The Times. The newspaper claims that neither Ukraine nor Russia expects a solution on the battlefield this year. It is supposed that the "big push" in the war will be next spring. And the Russian occupiers need to use Pokrovsk and Chasiv Yar in Donetsk oblast as footholds for their offensive. The Russian military command has redeployed reserve units from the Pokrovsk direction to Kursk oblast, where the Armed Forces of Ukraine are conducting an operation. 02.09	 Over the past day, a total of 182 combat clashes took place in frontline. At night, Russia fired a 48N6DM anti-aircraft missile from the S-400 at Kyiv. It was shot down by air defense – Defense Express. These surface-to-air missiles have extremely low accuracy, which poses a great danger to civilians. Defense lines are being built for street fighting in some areas of the city of Pokrovsk, Donetsk oblast. They began to be built in 2022 under the control of the military. 	➤ Belarus has moved equipment and military to the Lithuanian border. This was stated by the monitoring community Belaruski Gajun. In particular, The Belarusian military deployed the 19th Motorized Brigade Combined Arms Brigade, consisting of up to 2 motorized infantry companies (14 BMP-2, 2 Mul medical vehicles), a tank company (10 T-72B tanks, 1 BREM-1), 1 mortar battery (6 120-mm mortars 2S12 "Sani"), and vehicles. > On September 5, Lithuania completed the installation of counter-mobility equipment near the bridge connecting the country to Russia – Kaliningrad oblast. This was reported by the Lithuanian Ministry of Defense. Laurinas Kasciunas, the head of the ministry, explained that Vilnius could only set up obstacles in front of the bridge, being the property of the Russian Federation. In particular, it was blocked by "hedgehogs" and "dragon's teeth."

> The Commander-in-Chief of the Ukrainian Armed Forces, Oleksandr Syrskyi, gave an interview to CNN. Main points:

- > Over the past six days, the enemy has not advanced a single meter in the Pokrovsk direction: "And this weakening (of the Russians ed.) is undoubtedly felt in other areas."
- > Russia has a material advantage, in particular in aircraft, missiles, tanks, artillery, ammunition, and personnel. Therefore, Ukraine is forced to be "smarter and more efficient" in waging war.

Russia has deployed tens of thousands of troops to Kursk oblast, including some of its best airborne assault units.

- > Recruits are receiving shorter training than would be desirable. But the dynamics at the front require the deployment of new forces as soon as possible.
- > Delays in U.S. military aid have caused serious setbacks on the battlefield and led to a drop in morale.

> President Volodymyr Zelenskyi gave an interview to NBC News. Main points:

- Ukraine's operation in the Kursk oblast is a preventive strike to prevent Russia from forming buffer zones in the Kharkiv and Sumy oblasts. Kyiv will hold the seized Russian territory as long as it is necessary.
- > Absolutely all the defined tasks of our Kursk operation are being implemented," Zelenskyi said in his evening address. "And as of now, this operation continues to be the largest replenishment of the exchange fund due to one direction."
- > Few people knew about the offensive in Kursk—not only partners but also most institutions in Ukraine were not informed, which made it successful.

Russia pulled about 60,000 of its troops from other parts of the frontline to Kursk oblast. More than 600 Russians were captured in this area.

- > Western weapons are being delivered to Ukraine with delays. Because of this, in some areas of the frontline, Russians have significantly more weapons, which affects the course of hostilities and the number of casualties.
- > Ukraine will prepare a detailed plan for ending the war and propose it for consideration at the second Peace Summit, which Russian representatives will be invited to.

> Over the past day, 181 combat clashes occurred in the frontline. The situation was most tense in the Pokrovsk and Kurakhove directions.

During a Ramstein meeting, President Zelenskyi said that Russia had lost 6,000 soldiers killed and wounded in the month of the Armed Forces' operation in Kursk oblast. Meanwhile, Ukrainian troops are already controlling 1300 km² of Russian territory, which is about a hundred settlements.

> Russia is preparing further massive missile and drone strikes against Ukraine's energy sector. Prime Minister Denys Shmyhal said that there is already intelligence about the preparations.

- Russian troops have significantly intensified their offensive on the town of Vuhledar in Donetsk oblast, and have achieved some tactical success. According to Ukrinform, this is stated in the ISW report. "Russian offensive operations in the Vuhledar area are likely aimed at increasing pressure on Ukrainian forces defending the western part of Donetsk oblast and creating conditions for further success in Russia's priority offensive efforts in the Pokrovsk direction," the report says.
- According to the updated information from Deep State analysts, Ukrainian defense forces have regained positions in Niu York, Nelipivka, and near Lyptsi. They say that there is also enemy advancement. The Russians have advanced near Pishchane, Hirnyk, Stelmakhivka, Kalynivka, Lisivka, and Halytsynivka.
- The Azov Brigade regained control of a part of Niu York in Donetsk oblast and unblocked Ukrainian troops from encirclement. The soldiers managed to stabilize the situation, but it remains tense. Despite heavy fighting, Azov is holding the line and successfully counterattacking.

> Over the past day, 187 combat engagements took place in the frontline. The enemy was most active in the Pokrovsk and Kurakhove directions.

At night, Ukrainian drones attacked a large ammunition and equipment depot in Soldatskoye, Voronezh oblast of the Russian Federation. According to sources, the enemy was actively using this depot to transfer equipment to Ukraine. At the moment, four powerful fires and continuous detonation of ammunition have been recorded at the facility. Local authorities are urgently evacuating residents of nearby settlements.

The Russian Federation has received more than 200 ballistic missiles from Iran – The Times. These are Fath-300 missiles with a range of up to 112 km. They will expand Russia's ability to strike Ukrainian targets from long distances.

> British intelligence has stated that the Russian army has made tactical advances near Vuhledar in recent weeks. This area is likely to remain a hotspot.

Massive attacks per week

- Russia conducted massive shelling of Ukrainian territory every day.
- On 2 September, air defenses shot down nine ballistic and 13 cruise missiles, as well as 20 Shahed attack drones. In total, the Russians launched 16 Iskander-M/KN-23 ballistic missiles, 14 X-101 cruise missiles, 4 S-300/S-400 anti-aircraft missiles, and 23 drones.
- ➤ On 3 September, Ukrainian air defenses shot down 27 of 35 drones at night. Russia also attacked Ukraine with three Iskander-M/KN-23 ballistic missiles and an X-59/69 guided missile.
- On 4 September, Ukrainian air defenses shot down 22 attack drones and seven cruise missiles. A total of 42 Russian targets were detected, including 2 Kinzhal missiles, 2 X-22 missiles, 6 X-101 missiles, 3 Iskander-K missiles, and 29 Shahed drones.
- On 5 September, air defense shot down 60 Shahed attack drones. In total, Russia launched 1 Iskander-M ballistic missile and 78 drones.
- ➤ On 6 September, air defenses shot down 27 Shahed drones out of 44 launched by Russia. The Russians also attacked with one X-59 guided missile and one X-31P anti-aircraft missile. In total, air defenses were operating in Kyiv, Kirovohrad, Vinnytsia, Dnipro, Mykolaiv, Kherson, Poltava, Chernihiv, Kharkiv, Lviv, Donetsk, Zaporizhzhia, and Sumy regions.
- On 7 September, the air defenses shot down 58 of 67 Shahed drones.

Zaporizhzhia oblast

On 2 September, as a result of a Russian strike on Zaporizhzhia, 2 people were killed and 2 others were injured. On 3 September, the Russian Federation shelled the city of Zaporizhzhia, injuring 4 people. A 47-year-old woman was injured as a result of the Russian shelling of Huliaipole.

The following settlements in the region were under fire: Huliaipole, Novoandriivka, Novodanylivka, Robotyne, Mala Tokmachka, Preobrazhenka, Prymorske, Mali Shcherbaky, Malynivka and Poltavka, Piatykhatky, Zelene, Lobkove, Levadne and Malokaterinivka, Stepnohirsk, Olhivske, Verkhnia Tersa, Dolynka, Zelenyi Hai, Pryluky, and Zaporizhzhia.

Lviv and the oblast

On the morning of 4 September, the Russian army attacked Lviv with Shahed drones and rockets. The attack killed seven people and injured 66, including 10 children. Psychologists helped 103 victims, including 16 children. As a result of the night attack in Lviv, the Regional Centre for Sports Medicine and Rehabilitation was damaged on Konovaltsia Street. Three schools and the Centre for Creativity were also damaged in the night shelling in Lviv. More than 70 buildings in the historic part of the city and at least seven local architectural monuments were damaged.

On 6 September, 4 trucks in an industrial area caught fire as a result of a drone crash near Malekhiv, in the village of Murovane.

Kharkiv and the oblast

On 2 September, 50 people (including 7 children) were injured in Kharkiv as a result of shelling by 4 Iskander and 3 S-300 systems. Seven more civilians were injured in Liubotyn, Staryi Merchyk, and Kupiansk, and one woman died in Kupiansk. On 3 September, 14 people were injured in Kharkiv as a result of Russian shelling with a KAB munition. Also, in Kupiansk, one person died as a result of MLRS shelling. On 4 September, in Makarove village, the Russian army used a guided aerial bomb, killing one person and wounding 3. On 6 September, two people were wounded in the village of Tsyrkuny. Three people sought medical assistance after a previous rocket attack on Liubotyn. On 7 September, five people were injured as a result of a shelling of the Malodanylivka community. Also, a 73-year-old woman was killed as a result of a Russian strike on Kivsharivka in the Kupiansk district. In addition to the woman killed in Starovirovka, a 9-year-old child and two men were injured. A woman was also wounded in Vyshe Solone.

Deaths and injuries as a result of shelling were recorded in Chuhuiv, Kharkiv, Andriivka, Bilyi Kolodiaz, Liubotyn, Balakliia, Ivashky, Kozacha Lopan, Staryi Merchyk, Izium, Novoosynove, Kopanka, Bohuslavka, Bohodukhiv, Kupiansk, Kupiansk-Vuzlovyi. Shelling and destruction also occurred in Derhachi, Balakliia, Kindrashivka, Tsyrkunivka, Kurylivka, and Vilkhivka communities, including Hlushkivka, Kurylivka, Derhachi.

Sumy oblast

On 2 September, Russians launched a missile attack on the Sumy community, injuring 18 people (6 children). On 3 September, Russian troops bombed Yampil, damaging residential buildings and injuring four people. On 4 September, the Russians carried out air strikes on the guided aerial bomb of the Sumy community, as a result of one of the strikes, 1 person was wounded. On 6 September, the enemy carried out a mortar attack on the Krasnopillia community, killing 1 person and injuring 4 others.

The following areas were under fire: Sumy, Khotyn, Yunakivka, Miropillia, Bilopillia, Krasnopillia, Velyka Pysarivka, Putyvl, Nova Sloboda, Berezivka, Hlukhiv, Trostianets, Esman, Shalyhyne, Druzhbivka, Seredyna-Buda, Znob-Novhorod communities.

Dnipro and the oblast

During the week, Russians were shelling Nikopol district every day.

On 1 September, two people were injured in the Marhanets community of the Nikopol district as a result of artillery shelling. On 2 September, four women were wounded as a result of artillery shelling of Nikopol. In the evening of that day, Russians launched a missile attack on Dnipro: one person was killed, and six were injured. On the night of 3 September, Russians attacked the Nikopol district with Grad multiple rocket launchers, artillery, and kamikaze drones. Also, at night, Russian troops massively shelled the region's railway infrastructure. There is a wounded woman. On 4 September, Russians attacked Kryvyi Rih, injuring five people. A hotel, several high-rise buildings, four educational institutions, a pharmacy, and shops were damaged.

On the night of 6 September, Russian troops attacked four districts of the region: the Nikopol, the Kryvyi Rih, the Pavlohrad, and the Synelnykove districts. In particular, the Russians attacked the Nikopol district with drones, heavy artillery, and Grad multiple rocket launchers, which resulted in 2 people being injured in Nikopol. Up to ten private houses were damaged in the Synelnykove district. In the afternoon, Russians launched a missile attack on Pavlohrad: one person was killed, and 82 were injured, including children. More than 30 high-rise buildings, 27 shops, and a kindergarten were damaged.



Donetsk oblast

On 2 September, Russians launched a combined attack on Kurakhove with Uragan and cannon artillery, killing 4 people and wounding 10. On 3 September, Russian artillery shelled Selydove, killing 1 person and wounding 5 others, and artillery attacked Ukrainsk, killing 1 person and injuring 2 others. On 4 September, Russian troops shelled Kostiantynivka with cannon artillery, killing 2 people and injuring nine others. On 5 September, the Russian army shelled Kostiantynivka three times, killing 1 person and wounding 6. On 6 September in Kostiantynivka, as a result of the shelling by the Russian army, 1 person died, and 9 were wounded.

The following settlements in the oblast were shelled and damaged:

- > In the Volnovakha district: Novoukrainka, Bohoiavlenka of the Vuhledar community
- In the Pokrovsk district: Kurakhove, Kurakhivka, Selydove, Vovchenka, Trudove, Hannivka, Pokrovsk, Novoukrainka, Myrnohrad, Veselyi Hai, Hrodivka, Marynivka, Hirnyk, Izmailivka, Kotlyne, Ukrainsk; Pokrovsk, Ocheretyne, Kurakhivka, Maryinka, Dobropil, Hrodivka communities of Myrnohrad were also affected.
- In the Kramatorsk district: Kramatorsk, Lyman, Drobysheve, Raihorodk, Sloviansk, Nikonorivka, Hnativka, Kostiantynivka, Torske, Zarichne; Illinivska and Mykolaivska communities were affected.
- In the Bakhmut district: Toretsk, Siversk, Serebrianka, Dronivka, Petrivtsi; Chasiv Yar, Siversk, Pn.Toretsk communities were affected.

Poltava oblast

On 3 September, Russians launched a missile attack on the building of the Institute of Communications in Poltava: 55 dead and 297 wounded. 145 apartments were damaged.

Kyiv oblast

On 2 September, a rocket attack on Kyiv injured three people. The building of the Islamic cultural center AMU/SAMARC (Spiritual Administration of Muslims of the Autonomous Republic of Crimea) was damaged by falling debris.

Kherson and the oblast

On 1 September, Russians shelled 13 settlements. 10 high-rise buildings and 24 private houses were damaged, and 2 people were injured. On 2 September, Russian troops attacked Kindiivka: 1 dead, 2 wounded. An 18-year-old girl is injured in Kherson as a result of shelling. On 3 September, a 14-year-old child was wounded in the shelling of Kherson. There were also deaths and injuries in Sadove, Kizomys, Antonivka, Veletynske, Stanislav, and Beryslav. On 4 September, Russians shelled 18 settlements. Drone attacks resulted in injuries in Kindiika and Shyroka Balka. On 5 September, Russian troops shelled 13 settlements. In particular, Russians dropped explosives from a drone on three people in Sadove and one person in Kherson. On 6 September, the Russian army destroyed a kindergarten building in one of the villages of the Beryslav community. Russians also dropped explosives from a drone on public transport in Kherson, injuring a bus driver. There were injuries in Antonivka, Kozatske, Komyshany, and Oleksandrivka. On 7 September, Russian aviation dropped 5 guided bombs on the Beryslav region: a 28-year-old woman was wounded.

During the week, Russians shelled the following localities in the region: Antonivka, Sadove, Blahovishchenske, Kizomys, Bilozerka, Stanislav, Oleksandrivka, Pryozerne, Myroliubivka, Beryslav, Novoberyslav, Kachkarivka, Havrylivka, Tiahynka, Shevchenkivka, Novodmytrivka, Prydniprovske, Kozatske, Zelenivka, Komyshany, Novoraisk, Poniativka, Veletenske, Virivka, Burhunka, Sablukivka, Tomarine, Karerne, Chervonyi Maiak, Tokarivka, Novovorontsovka, Zolota Balka, Shyroka Balka, Tomyna Balka, Osokorivka, Odradokamianka, Rakivka, Mykilske, Urozhaine, Vesele, Kherson.

Mykolaiv oblast

On 1 September, Russians attacked the Kutsurub community with FPV drones and artillery. Residential buildings were damaged in the village of Solonchaky. On the afternoon of 2 September and on the night of 3 September, the Russian army attacked the Mykolaiv and the Voznesensk districts with Iskander-M ballistic missiles. On 3 September, Russians shelled Ochakiv and Kutsurub communities with artillery and FPV drones.

Chernihiv oblast

During the week, Russians fired mortars, cannon artillery, unmanned aerial vehicles, and FPV drones at border communities: Novhorod-Siverskyi, Semenivka, Snovsk, Horodnia.

In particular, on 2 September, 38 households caught fire in the border village of Semenivka community due to shelling, and the church was damaged. On 5 September, Russian troops allegedly launched a missile attack on Novyi Bilous.



- The Russian military executed three Ukrainian prisoners of war in the Toretsk direction, according to the Donetsk Regional Prosecutor's Office. A pre-trial investigation into the violation of the laws and customs of war, combined with premeditated murder, has been launched in connection with this incident.
- > Since the beginning of the invasion, Russia has destroyed or damaged more than 3,400 educational institutions, according to Prosecutor General Andrii Kostin. Over the 2.5 years of war, Russia has killed 572 children in Ukraine and injured another 1,568.
- > The IAEA supports Ukraine's intentions to expand its nuclear power industry, including the completion of two power units at the Khmelnytskyi Nuclear Power Plant. The organization is ready to provide technical support for this purpose.
- > British Ambassador Martin Harris inaugurated a room in his Kviv residence dedicated to Crimea and the Crimean Tatars. The leader of the Crimean Tatar people, Mustafa Dzhemiliev, was invited to the opening. The embassy specially commissioned artifacts, including works by renowned Crimean artisans, paintings by Scottish artist William Simpson, who accompanied British troops during the Crimean War, and medals from that time, to show the historical connection between the Ukrainian peninsula and Britain.
- > Ukraine has opened its first underground stabilization center. This hospital will provide soldiers with primary medical care and stabilization. It is part of a project implemented by the Ministry of Defense together with the Skhid Medical Force. According to the Ministry of Defense, "As part of this project, over two dozen underground stations are planned to be constructed near the front line." This hospital is located near the contact line. It was built on the basis of six bunkers and is equipped with electronic warfare systems.
- > At least seven local architectural monuments were damaged in Lviv as a result of Russia's nighttime attack, particularly on Konovaltsia and Kokorudza streets. This was reported by Maksym Kozytskyi, head of the Regional Military Administration. All the buildings are located within the historic area and UNESCO buffer zone. They are listed in the State Register of Immovable Monuments of Ukraine.
- > Evacuation trains will no longer depart from Pokrovsk due to the deteriorating security situation. This was stated on the website of the Myrnohrad City Military Administration. Starting on September 5, the initial departure station for evacuation trains will be Pavlohrad in Dnipropetrovsk Oblast.
- > The Russian occupation authorities are planning to demolish more than 20 high-rise buildings on the left bank of the temporarily occupied Mariupol, according to the Mariupol City Council. The occupiers have published the addresses of 21 buildings on the left bank of Mariupol that are to be demolished.
- > Residents of two districts of Sumy Oblast Shostka and Konotop will be evacuated. This was reported by the Sumy Regional Military Administration. The five settlements in question are Hlukhiv, Esman, Svesa in the Shostka region, Manukhivka, and Ivanivka in the Konotop district.

- > The Office of the Prosecutor General is investigating 28 instances Ukrainian prisoners being shot by Russian troops since the beginning of the full-scale war, resulting in the deaths of 62 Ukrainian servicemen. This was announced by Prosecutor General Andriy Kostin in response to a CNN request. Sources in the Main Intelligence Directorate of the Ministry of Defense of Ukraine provided CNN with a list of 15 execution cases since November 2023, most of which have been confirmed through video and audio intercepts from drones.
- Vadym Filashkin, head of the Donetsk Regional Military Administration, reported that 24,500 people remain in Pokrovsk, with 1,600 children in the community, 929 of whom are Pokrovsk. Over the past month, more than 20,000 people have left Pokrovsk, including more than 3,000 children.
- > In the occupied part of Kherson Oblast, collaborators accompanied by the military visited the homes of Ukrainian families and attempted to coerce children into attending schools that had adopted a Russian curriculum. Adults were threatened with the loss of parental rights if they refused. This was reported by the National Resistance Center. Additionally, the Russians inspected children's gadgets for applications that could be used for remote learning in Ukrainian educational institutions.
- > Two elderly women who were unable to leave the Russian-occupied part of Kherson Oblast on their own have been returned to the government-controlled territory, according to Ukrainian Parliament Commissioner for Human Rights, Dmytro Lubinets.
- > In the Luhansk region, Russians have halted the supply of drinking water to the population of occupied Lysychansk and have promised to repair the centralized water supply system for the third consecutive year. This was reported by Artem Lysogor, head of the Luhansk Regional Military Administration, in a Telegram message, according to Ukrinform.
- > While rescuing children from the town of Hirnyk, White Angel law enforcement officers came under fire from an enemy drone. Despite this, the police crew successfully evacuated two families from the front line: a large family with five children and a 4-year-old girl with her mother.
- The Office of Mine Action of the State Emergency Service of Ukraine has been established. It will be responsible for planning, monitoring, and implementing demining tasks. According to Ihor Klymenko, Minister of Internal Affairs of Ukraine, on September 6, sappers from the Ministry of Internal Affairs examined over 200 hectares of territory and destroyed nearly 600 explosive devices.
